Around the Safaa Golf Club

The golf course is an excellent place to observe many of the birds found at KAUST. The variety of habitats attracts both migrant and resident species.

There is a bird hide overlooking the main lake where water birds, including different species of herons, can be viewed at leisure. Two other lakes are also often productive.

The wooded areas and tall trees offer cover to many species and there is usual a plentiful supply of insects on which to feed. It is in these areas that a number of the most unusual birds have been found at KAUST. The open grassed fairways appeal to some species, including attractive bee-eaters and waders. A number of local birds have become resident here and many migrant species visit.

On Sunday afternoons the course is open to walkers and this is the best time to visit. During passage periods up to 50 species may be observed in one visit. At other times visits to the bird hide can be arranged by contacting the golf reception at 808 6158.

There are walking paths around the course which usually take about 60 minutes to complete. Arriving at the main pool towards dusk is highly recommended as many birds fly in or out at this time.

Over 170 birds have been seen at the golf course A complete list is posted on the noticeboard in the reception area.





Caspian Tern *Hydroprogne cassia* 53 cm

The world's largest tern frequently visits the main lake, plunge diving for the abundant fish found there. It has a bright red beak and is resident in the area.

Black-crowned Night Heron Nycticorax nycticorax 60 cm

During the day these herons are usually hidden in the thicker parts of the podocarpus trees. The adults have black caps and backs. The juvenile birds are streaked and have a diagnostic red eye when seen well.



Green Bee-eater Merops orientalis 24 cm

Often found perched on one of the rope posts from where they hunt insects, including bees. A resident. Usually found in pairs. Smaller than the similar migrant

Squacco Heron Ardeola ralloides 45 cm

This small heron looks a dull yellow brown when seen standing. However, in flight its white wings become evident. It is often skulking at the main pool.



Black Scrub Robin Cercotrichas podobe 18 cm

A local bird, well established at the golf club. Usually seen feeding on fairways but with cover nearby. The long tail has white tips. It often sweeps the tail in a circular motion.

Black-winged Stilt Himantopus himantopus 37 cm

This elegant bird has long red legs. It is often found in groups resting on the sides of the main lake. It is resident in the area and duller juvenile birds are often found with them.



Ruepell's Weaver Ploceus glabula 11 cm

A common resident which makes the familiar dome shaped nest. Females and juvenile birds are duller than the brightly coloured yellow male. Often nests in colonies. Noisy, chattering continuously.
